It should be noted that the St. Mary's Drum Corps had a stellar reputation since they have been invited to march in the famous New Year's Day Rose Bowl Parade in Pasadena California several times.

The Detroit Chinatown's 250th anniversary parade segment was a colorful display of the St. Mary's Drum Corps in their beautiful Chinese uniforms marching in precise formations followed by the equally colorful Dragon Dance Team winding down the avenues to the rhythmic beat of the drum, gong, and cymbals to the delight of the crowd along the parade route. All that was missing in this atmosphere of excitement & awe was the booming sound of firecrackers and smoke for many Midwesterners who probably have never saw so many Chinese Americans in one place at any one time. A festive day indeed, concluding with a tasty Chinese Banquet in Chinatown with the bonus of guys and gals socializing and spending some quality time together from San Francisco, Detroit, and New York. A great example of collaboration and logistics planning between the three Chinatowns working together to portray the Chinese American Image in Detroit's 250th birthday celebration was a huge success for all involved.
